reetings to All!



Curator's Report

s we look forward to the programs and events of this new year, it is still a pleasure to remember the past. In 2018, we were celebrating our 35th Anniversary recalling that in 1983, the Town purchased this property to become a cultural, educational and social center for this area and beyond. Over the years so much has been accomplished!

Last year, there were 288 scheduled events and use, approximately 10,500 visitors to this site, and \$59,884 received in rental income. The Friends acquired 31 new members, and \$15,184 was received in membership dues. At year-end we were grateful to all for the \$10,000 sent in response to Annual Appeal letters, a record amount for this Appeal.

Under the Buildings and Grounds Committee, many improvements were planned and completed. The Buhrmaster Barn received new lighting and increased power capacity. The potting shed was newly painted and the steps to the Schoolhouse rebuilt. Along with help from the Town crew and Highway Department with a man and bucket truck, several dead trees and branches were removed from the grounds. The Friends, with a \$1500 grant, arranged for a professional lighting study to plan for adequate lighting of the grounds and the replacement of all the aging lampposts on the grounds. Most important is our Board's ongoing collaboration with Town officials on the much needed exterior restoration of Pruyn House, a project which may span more than two years.

The highlight of our summer, the beloved five Concerts in the Barn, were presented with the help of generous supporters whose donations totaling \$6,560 helped underwrite the expenses. Under our Education Committee, there were four programs arranged, two musical and two talks. One of these by historian Michael Barrett covered the history of the Meneely Bell Company and highlighted our own 1864 Meneely Bell hanging in the Schoolhouse. Also, in partnership with the Historical Society (HSTC), two different bus trips were planned. In the spring, members and friends visited sites in the Berkshires, and in the fall traveled to Cooperstown.

Serving on our House Refurbishing Committee is Board Trustee Gary Thompson who was previously Librarian at Siena College, now retired. Gary has found many 19th century newspapers and books to add to our Collections. During the year, several of our dear members passed on and we are grateful for the gifts to Pruyn House donated in memory of these loyal members. Over the years, we have received special period pieces from members and others, adding to our Collections.

With all of the activities we have promoted, we must mention the important role of our volunteers. These are our Board members, greeters at all our events, helpers at the Concerts, the members of our two Garden Clubs and many others. In this exciting year ahead we have scheduled nineteen weddings, many community group events and meetings, programs, bus trips, and, as always, the Concerts, Old Fashioned Sunday and Holiday events. We value and rely on the assistance we receive from Town officials and Departments. Staying in touch with you, our members, is important as we continue with our newsletters, e-mail contacts, and through our Website and Facebook page. The office staff is here to help in any way we can and welcome your input and suggestions.





Reading To Acquire Useful Information And Knowledge

The wise man perceives that every advance he makes in knowledge opens to him some new and unexpected prospect.

y the 1830's, American reading interests were changing from the Bible and religious piety to more secular topics for self-improvement and social reform. It was a new utilitarian age of the "book farmer" and literate clerks, mechanics, and merchants. People moving to cities for jobs and excitement needed to read street signs, public notices and business correspondence. Workers sought advancement by learning new skills by reading manuals, textbooks and self-help books. Citizens read newspapers, pamphlets,

almanacs and magazines to keep up with civic affairs and social reforms. In the urban milieu with increased schooling and leisure time, adults frequented libraries, lyceums, athenaeums and coffeehouses. Denizens wanted to expand their horizons through books about "stages of life", "household management" and home editions for medicine, law, philosophy and agriculture. The Pruyn House library includes *The Complete Home (1879), Means and Ends or Self-training* by Catharine Maria Sedgwick (1840), and *Plain Home Talk about ...Embracing Medical Common Sense (1888).*

To be successful in this rapidly changing business and social climate, 19th c. Americans needed to be able to read purposively, converse effectively, and network widely. Casparus Pruyn would have relied upon local publications such as the Cultivator and Country Gentlemen magazines, the Young Farmer's Manual and Webster's Calendar for advice on farming his plot on Old Niskayuna Road. At the Albany Academy, the Pruyn sons — Robert, Francis and William - studied oratory, surveying, bookkeeping and other practical skills so that they could converse with professionals in business, law, and engineering. The Pruyns had access to books and discussion on a wide range of topics at the Albany Lyceum of Natural History (f. 1824), the Albany Institute (f. 1823), and the Apprentices Library (f. 1821). The Young Men's Organization (f. 1835) had a library and a reading room to encourage profitable use of leisure time. Albany's Northern Light magazine founded in 1841 was devoted to "free discussion and the diffusion of useful knowledge".

Stephen Van Rennselaer helped found The Society for the Promotion of the Useful Arts in New York State in 1819. Later Robert H. Pruyn was President. In the society's 1813 annual address, Dr. Theodore R. Beck described the zeitgeist: "Knowledge advances civilization, gives new energy to the mental powers... The maxim 'knowledge is power' is daily elucidated in the affairs of life." The Pruyn family would have been active members in the various reading clubs, societies, and special purpose organizations in Albany designed to promote reform and individual improvement. In conversation and debates, the "cosmopolitan" men (and later women) strutted their knowledge of current events, culture, history, science and travel in a manner similar to what we do today through "social media".
