

he Friends of Pruyn House would like to thank Laura Archambault of the Community Center, Youth Services Division, for organizing Global Youth Service Day.



2018 Buildings and Grounds

aĥe Building and Grounds Committee is happy to report that we are now two! One of our newest Board members, Jamie Easton, has agreed to be a committee member. Jamie is an engineer and a most wonderful addition to the Committee. We'll certainly use his expertise, because the Friend's architect, Mark Thaler, states that by the time you read this, the exterior repair project will have gone out to bid. We may well have a contractor ready to start work soon. The project needs to be done in abovefreezing weather, so the repairs will start this summer, take a break in cold weather and then pick up again next spring. We hope you will watch the progress!

Our other two projects involve lighting and power. The Friends have had new lighting installed in the Barn! We also have added a new power supply to the Barn so that the caterers, bands, and parties won't have issues with blown circuits. Wonderful! The Friends have instituted a professional exterior lighting study developed by Environmental Design & Research. The study creates a plan to replace and improve pathway and building exterior lighting. We received a grant from the Albany County Convention and Visitor's Bureau which helped to pay one half of the cost of the study. The study is complete and now the Friends will need to review it and decide how and




Please note the new steps and landscaping at the entrance to the schoolhouse.

his lovely blue velveteen settee is the gift of Diane Pruyn Freer and Bob Freer. It has been passed down in Diane's family for generations, as it belonged to her greatgrandmother, Mary Scott Pruyn. Mary was the wife of Colonel John Pruyn, who served with Teddy Roosevelt in the 1898 Spanish American War. This war, which the U.S. won, was the first overseas conflict fought by the U.S. and it ended Spanish rule in the Americas. Mary maintained their home in Yonkers, NY, caring for their many children and some elderly relatives. The Friends of Pruyn House is proud to display this piece in the second floor front bedroom.


Legislative Grant



The Pruyn Children at Home and at School

n the early 1800's three American institutions cared for elementary education: family, church, and school. Mothers and fathers primed children in the alphabet and then taught them how to speak, read and count by 4 or 5 years of age. It was the duty of every parent "to put a library into the hands of his children" according to *The NY Mercantile Advertiser*. By the 1830's, book publishers expanded their marketing to family and children. Harper & Row produced the "American Family Library" series with 52 titles. As an upper class urban family, the Pruyns would have provided their youngsters with elementary primers, readers, and geography, history and other textbooks and reference books. The Pruyn House has examples: Goodrich's *Child's History of the United States*, Long's *Home Geography*, and *Young Folk's Cyclopedia of Common Things*.

Sunday schools taught young boys and girls to recite Bible passages and to read psalms, psalters and moral lessons. The American Sunday School Union (ASSU) published six million books by 1830. The Pruyn House Library has two ASSU publications: *Infant Teacher's Manual: for the Use of Sunday Schools and Families and Lessons for Every Sunday*.



Before 1820 90% of Americans lived in rural towns and villages, with few schools. By contrast, the Pruyn family lived in Albany, the 10th largest city in the United States, before they moved into the Pruyn House around 1830. As a result, they had access to early common schools such as the Albany Lancastrian School, Loudonville School District and Latham School District, all authorized under the 1812 state legislation. Families paid tuition for young children to attend when they could be released from farm chores. In New York State, private academies met the need for advanced education beyond the elementary years and to prepare students for college and the professions, expanding from 34 in 1826 to 127 in 1840. The Pruyns were privileged to have access to the Albany Academy founded in 1813 and the Albany Female Academy founded in 1814.

Casparus Pruyn had eight children who lived to adulthood: Robert, Francis, Elizabeth, Cornelia, Alida, William, Augustus and Mary. Robert and

Francis started at the Albany Academy at 10 years old and finished at 15 and 17 respectively, before going into law and civil engineering. William attended from 1837 to 1839 before going into business. Cornelia attended the Albany Female Academy until she was 18. Thanks to the Albany Academy archives staff for this research. Next issue will discuss school textbooks from the period.
