2018 Summer Concerts In The Barn



Summer Weddings





2018 Buildings and Grounds

he Pruyn House will be going through many exciting changes in the near future. One significant change will be a complete restoration of the exterior of the building. The last time significant exterior preservation work was done on the house was in the 1980's. The Board of Trustees, in coordination with the Town of Colonie, have hired Lacey Thaler Reilly Wilson Architects and Preservation, LLP. They have developed rehabilitation and preservation plans for the exterior of the Pruyn House which will be done in phases. We anticipate it will take between two and three years for all work to be complete. Some of the work that will occur on the exterior of the building will include a new roof and preservation and rehabilitation of both front and rear entry ways. In addition, the existing exterior paint on the building will be removed, damaged bricks will be replaced, and new gutters and shutters will be installed.

In concert with the exterior preservation work, the Building and Grounds Committee will enhance the property's site lighting, which will provide better visibility during nighttime events. The walkways and parking areas will be our main focus. Building and grounds members will work with New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation to ensure the appearances of the light fixtures will fit into this historic property setting.

We expect all this work to start in the spring of 2019. As the exterior work commences, we ask visitors and members to be patient as this important work takes place. The preservation and rehabilitation plan may take time but will provide future generations the ability to enjoy the historical grounds and buildings of The Pruyn House for many years to come.


Moving On...

Taking over as Assistant Curator is **Tami Sherry**, who will continue to implement programs and trips, edit the newsletter and assist the Board in all endeavors.



School Subjects and Textbooks The Pruyn Children Encountered



ineteenth Century New York State witnessed the rise of common schools (1812-1820), academies (1815-1835), and later public high schools (1850-1870). School attendance did not become compulsory until 1870. Before 1840, less affluent students attended common school sporadically, while more affluent children attended the academies for six to eight months until 15 to 17 before going to college and/or into the professions or business. Robert, Francis and William Pruyn went to the Albany Academy in the 1820's and 1830's. The only record for a Pruyn daughter is Cornelia attending the Albany Female Academy until she was 18. Most girls lagged behind in school attendance during this period.

In the first half of the 19th century, the American **common school** curriculum moved beyond simple primers and spellers to include readers, arithmetic, and later geography and history. To impart practical skills schools added courses like surveying and bookkeeping. The guiding principles of American education were morality and character, discipline, useful knowledge and citizenship. **Academies** provided a more advanced curriculum offering English and Classical tracks with Latin/Greek, advanced English, mathematics, science, rhetoric, and philosophy. The Albany Academy offered this course of study in 1815:


"Reading the English Language with propriety and construing it grammatically, English Grammar and Grammatical Exercises, Delivery of selected pieces (i.e., oration of prose and poetry), Geography and History, the first five rules of Arithmetic, Book-Keeping, and the principles of English Composition."


When the Pruyn children were at Albany Academy in the 1820's and 1830's, the curriculum had grown to include ancient history and biography, government, letter writing, chemistry and physics and moral philosophy. The Academy students read the Bible, Virgil and Cicero, Homer, history texts as well as advanced readers on a wide range of contemporary subjects. They progressed from Webster's spellers and Beattie's Arithmetic to Olney's Geography, Bowditch's Navigation, Goldsmith's History of England, Paley's Moral Philosophyand Bullion's English Grammar. Bullion was a beloved professor at AA from 1824 to 1848. Academies aimed "to give a child an education that shall fit him for ...eminence in his profession, whether mercantile or mechanical" and to give him "a different education from any which our public schools can now furnish".


The Pruyn House Library has examples of school textbooks from the period for reading, rhetoric, geography, mathematics, history and science, demonstrating important trends in American schoolbook publishing. McGuffey's Reader, Webster's speller and Russell's Common School Reader and Speaker, Olney's United States History and Long's Home Geography for Primary Grades evince the new emphasis on America language, literature and history. Bentley's American Instructor and Sweet's Practical Elocution are samples of local publishing in Albany and Troy. Adams' Arithmetic has exercises to show students how to handle receipts and bills, demonstrating the importance of practical knowledge. Comstock's Elements of Chemistry and Gray's How Plants Grow show the desire of schools to have a modern curriculum transmitting the latest scientific discoveries.

When you visit the Pruyn House, take a look at the Home Library to see what children and adults read at home and at school during the early to middle to late nineteenth century.
