

Diane Morgan - Curator's Report

January 2018

No doubt, 2017 was another successful year for the Friends of Pruyn House. A large part of this success is due to an active Board of Trustees, a great number of supporters and volunteers and a positive working relationship with the Town Board, officials, Department heads and custodial crew.

As always, our summer Concerts in the Barn are the highlight of our Programs. This year, approximately 2000 people attended with an intake of approximately \$9,000. In addition, generous donations from special groups and individuals covered the costs of the performers and publicity. Also, we had an amazing response to a special Children's concert which the Friends sponsored in June. Our Membership numbers remain steady, about 510, with most new members joining during the concert season.

Under our Program committee two enjoyable bus trips were planned, one a cruise to Herkimer House and another, on a lovely fall day, to historic Deerfield Village. Another great day was our Old Fashioned Sunday complete with Town Bands playing throughout the day, crafters, vendors, a magician, storyteller and pony rides for the children. Our year concluded with a December Open House weekend, successful Greens Sales sponsored by the Garden Clubs, and a Members' Holiday Party.

So many groups and individuals continue to rent this facility with a record \$61,400 received in rental income. Our Barn and spectacular Gardens are a big attraction. In May a local group held a special Cinco de Mayo celebration. We hosted eighteen wedding ceremonies and receptions, two group fundraisers, two large church picnics, an Art Show, Children's Art classes and the annual Weavers 4-day Show and Sale. Eight different groups regularly use the House

or School for meetings including the Garden Clubs, a neighborhood association, a music group and the 125th Regiment, Civil War re-enactors.

In April, a special gathering was held in memory of Jean Olton, past Town Historian and a Founder of Pruyn House. Also, donations were received in memory of departed Friends, Mary Kosinski, and members of the Henkes Family. Further, we are grateful for the generous response to our Annual Appeal.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee oversaw the replacement of three roofs on outbuildings, new front steps for the Schoolhouse and a rebuilt retaining wall at the rear of the House. Most exciting was a generous offer by Lowe's to donate materials and work at this site. Their personnel, called Lowe's Heroes, volunteered for a week which included scraping and painting the garage, and replacement of the fencing in front of the restroom facility. In addition, Lowe's donated paint, lumber, a post-hole digger, a power pump, plants, mulch and yard bags. Special thanks as well to Carol and Dennis Fitzgerald who made numerous repairs on the property.

For this year of 2018, the focus is on upgrading the power and light fixtures in the Barn as well as a number of lampposts on the grounds. In collaboration with the Town, a primary goal is to begin the repair work needed on the exterior of the House. This year we will be celebrating our 35th Anniversary as a historic and cultural center. We continue to reach out to you our Members through our website, Facebook, our Newsletters and mailings. This is your Center! Our greatest source of strength is from you and people in the surrounding area. We look forward to your input and suggestions. Let us hear from YOU!





What the Pruyns Read: Christian Texts and Moral Stories



The leaders of the Protestant Reformation made the Bible available in vernacular languages so ordinary folk could learn from the Bible. By the early nineteenth century spurred by the Second Great Awakening, most homes in America had a Bible. Children learned Bible verses by rote and recited them to the family. Unfortunately, we do not have the Pruyn family Bible. By the 1830's the American Sunday School Union, the American Bible Society and the American Tract Society had traveling agents distributing thousands of Bibles, concordances, catechisms, children's lessons and parables and religious tracts. The Pruyn House library has examples of these publications as well as popular adult Christian texts such as Robert Russell's *Seven Sermons*, Dante's *Divine Comedy*, John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress* and Grotius' *Truth of the Christian Religion*. Grotius probably had special interest for the Pruyns due to his Dutch heritage. The Pruyns would have discussed traditional and contemporary religion during family time in the parlor.


During this period a reform movement took hold in America, with an emphasis upon self-improvement and social betterment, including temperance, abolition and women's rights. Supporting this movement, intensive and serious reading was targeted towards deep understanding of texts, devotional inspiration and moral edification. Noah Webster, whose first American dictionary was published in 1828, admonished children to "think what you read in your spare time". In 1813 Elisa White wrote: "The end of reading is not attained by getting through the book, but by receiving those serious and deep impressions which will have practical influence upon the future life." Publishing of children's books began to abound with moral lessons for boys and girls, so that they could grow up to have good character. Some examples in the Pruyn House Library are: *Marcus*, or the Boy-Tamer by Walter Aimwell and *Young Woman's Friend*, or the Duties, Trials, Loves, and Hopes of Woman by Daniel Eddy. We also own issues of a magazine, Child's Paper, published by the American Tract Society in 1855, which contained stories, poems and essays intended for enjoyment while teaching children how to behave. The popular McGuffey's Reader said: "Read because mama tells me that play will not be of any use to me after I grow up, but if I love to read I shall be wise and good."
